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BANGLADESH MISSION REPORT: DECEMBER 2012

Because of the culture and poverty, mission trips to Bangladesh are never routine. No matter how much one may plan, the unexpected happens. However, this time, by God's grace, things went quite well. For that I am thankful.

On the way to Bangladesh, I stopped in Singapore to renew contact with some Christians who support our work in Bangladesh. In Dhaka, the capital of Bangladesh, I met with some of our gospel workers and with Christian leaders from other fellowships who have been helpful to us over the past few years. I had also arranged to meet a representative of the Bible League International who wanted to visit our mission center and to see our projects. He accompanied me on my journey to some of our village churches. He was impressed by the fact that so many villagers would like to have Bibles, which we are able give them as funds allow.

I thank God and am grateful to the many churches that make mission trips like this one possible. On this trip I tried to visit as many of our churches as possible. The photographs show some of our activities. The photo at right shows us unloading Bibles after crossing one of the many rivers on our way to the village of Bagdha where we have one of our largest churches. I take Bibles to as many churches as I can, for there is always a need. Because there are no roads in many of these places, we transport the Bibles using rickshaws and boats.

Old Multipurpose Mission Center

severely damaged, deemed unfit for use



There is a serious situation concerning our old Multipurpose Mission Center. We have recently had a report from an engineering firm that the building is unsafe and dangerous to use. They felt that the initial damage was due to an earthquake or frequent cyclones and periodic floods leading to slippage before the recent inspection.

The engineer's report says that because the main support structure has been so damaged, the building has to be dismantled. A local government inspector gave us a warning that the building needs to be condemned or a fine will be posted.

For many years, this building has played a vital part in preaching the gospel in the villages of Bangladesh. This is where we had our larger fellowship gatherings and bible studies. It was the focus of many mission related activities, including the nurses' training school with their dormitory rooms, etc..

All this confirmed the importance of making a start on the reconstruction project as soon as possible. We are temporally using other ways of accommodating the nurses training program, but we will have to close that program due to lack of dormitory facilities which are in the damaged building.

Total cost to rebuild—Approximately \$158,000

The replacement building will look very much like the one in the above photo.

The first phase would be to construct a single story building for large fellowship gatherings, and function as a base for our nurses' training course. This building would be constructed so that it could support one or two extra floors as funds become available.

The final cost of the three story building which would fully replace the old damaged building is about \$158,000. It would have a raised foundation and would be of steel reinforced construction to withstand any future earth quakes or natural disasters, etc.. Rebuilding is indeed a big undertaking, but together we will be able to re-build this very important asset for the gospel work.

Thank you in advance for your help in this very important rebuilding project to glorify Christ's name in Bangladesh. We greatly appreciate your laborious endeavors for God's work worldwide, to serve Him.

Nurse's Assistant Training

As of July 2012, a total of 320 girls received nurse's assistant training.

All these students were chosen from small local villages. After completion of their training, 95% were employed in different hospitals of the country and their respective village based clinics.

Before receiving the training, they did not have jobs, but a hopeless life and were a burden to their families. After completing the training, they received good jobs that pay well and have become as living witnesses for Jesus among their people and country.

Twenty students still need stipend to complete their nurse's assistant program. The approximate cost, \$150.00 per nurse's assistant student to complete the three month course - including tuition, books, travel, lodging cost, etc.

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Celebration of the 400-year Anniversary of the King James Bible

Redlands, CA: On October 21, the Bengali Evangelical Association (BEA) hosted a public lecture in Redlands, California in celebration of the 400-year anniversary of the publishing of the King James Bible.



The event, which was attended by 80 people, opened with worship. John and Naomi Biswas welcomed the guests and explained the purpose of the event to the attendees.



Pastor Neil Earle presented a lecture focused on the story of the great men and events leading up to publication of the King James Bible in 1611.

Neil began by showing a video of the King James Bible being read from moon orbit in December 1968.

He then went on to show from history how the King James translation of the Bible had impacted the speech and culture of the English speaking world and how it had helped bring the gospel to the common people of all the cultures worldwide.

Many reference books and articles were on display and BEA offered each guest a King James Bible and a book of Bible promises, paid for by a generous donor.

The participants came from various walks of life and cultural backgrounds. They enjoyed the message as well as the fellowship meal at the conclusion of this educational event.
